# District 7 To Hold Carp Shoot

Vicksburg Bowmen in co-operation with MBH District 7 will hold a two day Carp Shoot, May 15 and 16, in St. Joseph County on the St. Joe River. The shoot will begin Saturday morning at 8:00 a.m. and continue until 12:00 noon on Sunday. If you don't care to fish all of these hours you can come and go as you wish.

Headquarters will be at the fishing site which is located two and a half miles south east of Three Rivers on River Road. Signs will be up to help direct you.

Plenty of camping and trailer space is available for overnight camping. Vicksburg Bowmen are handling the food and there will be complete meals as well as sandwiches and snacks so there is no need to bring food. Prices will be reasonable.

Be sure and bring your light for night shooting and your boat.

Prizes will be awarded on the Lewis system. Bring your MBH card with you as there will be an ertra registration fee for non-members.

### 1964 Deer and Bear Statistics

Earl Taylor, Governor of District 6

So often we are asked by bow hunters and prospective bow hunters, for deer and bear hunting statistics, that I feel it would be of extreme interest to members to list a few, gathered from the big game award applications of our successful hunters from the past 1964 hunting season.

Three black bear kills were reported. Don Schram of Forest Park, Illinois, had the largest, verified by an authentic weight slip. His 421 pound male bruin taken in Iron County on September 12, 1964 was hit at a distance of 12 feet with a 70 pound bow. Robert Mull, of Brookfield, Illinois, took a 280 pound male bear in Iron County on September 6, 1964. His was hit at a distance of nine yards and with a 60 pound bow. The third, a 225 pound male was taken by John DeWar of Deerfield, Illinois in Iron County on September 12, 1964. It was his at a

his deer blind and a deer was close. On the last day of their trip he decided to leave his bow in camp and take his shot gun and sit in a blind where he had seen some nice big squirrels. (He hadn't seen a deer from this particular blind.) Lo and behold here he sits with his shot gun, and out walks the nicest buck with a beautiful rack. The buck never knew he was there and came within forty feet of him. He would have had all the time in the world to have made a perfect shot if he had had his bow and arrow along. Mary and Clarence went back to Detroit empty handed but said they really had a good laugh out of the experience and feel this is part of the pleasure of bow hunting.

Loring Clipfell and Darwin Buckhold of Three Rivers had a successful wild boar hunt with bow and arrow at an Indiana game preserve. One boar weighed 110 pounds and the other 80 pounds. Clipfell had an unforgetable experience with his boar, that by the way had four inch tusks. His shot did not kill the savage beast instantly and put Clipfell up a tree before dropping dead.

distance of 6 feet and a 60 pound bow was used.

All three bear were hit in the chest and rib section. On one kill the arrow pierced both the heart and lungs and on the other two, lungs were pierced. On two, arrow penetration was complete and on the other, twenty inches of penetration was achieved.

Members reported a total of 187 deer kills. This was a hunter success ratio of slightly less than 9% of the membership. Tom Hayner of Litchfield reported the largest deer, a 174 pound doe taken in Cheboygan County.

The average distance of each hit was 25.24 yards. The average weight of bows used by hunters was 46.7 lbs. The three most popular bow weights used were 50, 47 and 45 pounds respectfully.

The success ratio was heavier in Gladwin County with 19 kills. Clare, and Calhoun counties had 11 each, Iron, Kalamazoo and Alpena Counties, 9 each, Presque Isle, Lake and Alcona 8 each. The balance covered a wide range of counties in both the Upper and Lower Peninsulas and ranged from one to six each.

We haven't heard yet how the MBH hunter success ratio compares with the Michigan Department of Conservation figures on their basis of bow hunting licenses sold, but in past years MBH members were usually well in the lead, percentage-wise. It is possible we may be able to have some kind of a state-wide report later in the year.

#### WIDE-OPEN FISHING AT U.P. POND

LANSING—A quirk of nature and the alert eyes of Conservation Department fisheries biologists have resulted in the opening of Hermansville Mill Pond, Menominee County, to unlimited hook and line fishing for the balance of 1965.

Acting upon a field report that the pond faces a threat of heavy winter-kill, Conservation Director Ralph A. MacMullan this week signed a special order which permits anglers to take fish of any kind, size and number from the Upper Peninsula water during any time this year.

# MBH Membership Contest

The Michigan Bow Hunters membership contest is in full swing and members are doing a fine job of sending in new and renewal memberships.

The contest continues thru July 31st and many fine prizes are available to contestants. Rules are elsewhere in this bulletin. Remember a new individual membership counts one point and a family membership counts two points. On renewals, three renewals, whether they be individual or family memberships count one point.

At this writing, Bob Winans leads in the contest with nine new members sent in. Luther Tracy, and Frank Bushre have five each. Jack Davis has five new members and four renewals for a total of six and 1/3 points.

As of March 1, 1965 we had a total of 2174 members. Actually our true membership count is more than this figure as in taking the count we count individual memberships one and family memberships as two. We do not count the additional members on a family card.

As most of you are well aware, the main object of Michigan Bow Hunters is favorable legislation for bow hunters. The more members we have, the stronger our voice. Each member of
