#### MBH Bob Cat Hunt Coming Up

The first week-end after New Years Day each January is set aside for the annual MBH cat hunt. The '67 hunt will be the 8th one held in the Onaway area and the dates are January 7th & 8th. Headquarters for the hunt will be the Metropole Hotel where hunters may register for either or both days of the hunt. Registration fee is only \$1.00 plus your MBH membership card. This entitles you to hunt both days if you wish.

The usual group of Onaway guides will conduct the hunt with hunting groups forming at head-quarters about 8:00 AM each morning. Then they will travel out of town by car to the hunting areas located by the guides earlier in the morning.

Only bow hunting tackle may be used and don't forget your small game license. Dress warmly but keep the weight as light as possible — 'cause YOUR two feet will have to carry it. And speakin' of feet, you should bring snow shoes — just in case. Several times in the past few years they haven't been needed but you never know what the weather will be this time.

There will be a Saturday evening supper at the Metropole Hotel ——set up buffet style as before. A small fee will be charged at the door for this meal but at this writing the menu and cost per person have not been decided upon.

President of the Chamber of Commerce, Sam Alexander, has given us the word that again this year the merchants of Onaway will contribute prizes to be given at the Saturday evening supper.

Hackney's Restuarant, just "kittycornered" from the Hotel will be open for breakfast early Saturday morning and Elinore's Restaurant three miles west of town will be open about 6:00 Sunday morning — each serving good substancial food for a fair price. Some of the other local restuarant owners are not sure they will be open that early.

#### 'Nockin' Round Th' North

(continued from page 1)

First came that cold snowy Memorial Day to blast fruit blossoms. Then came one of the worst dry seasons on record. Wildlife was hard hit by the absence of berries — those fruits that the frost missed dried up in the hot dry air. One complaint was received of raccons pulling oats down in farm fields for food. There is much evidence of bear searching for food in Cheboygan County bushes and small trees mangled while fruits were still green, Even coyotes have been sighted close to summer cottages looking closely for things edible. The dry season created still a worse hazzard for the game, as fields and forest were so tinder dry that it took very little to start things burning. The forest fire boys were on 24 hour alert and practically lived in their hard hats — constantly putting out small fires. They did manage to contain them in most cases. Early in the season though

the Damon fire in Ogemaw County area around Rose City and West Branch took 4,000 acres. Then in the first part of July a two mile long fire was stopped by backfire in Crawford County. As if this wasn't enough, the insects moved it — the jack pine budworm, the larch sawfly, and the Saratoga spittlebug which attacks the red pine. The U.S. Forest Service sprayed a 400 acre area in Oscoda County and some in Crawford for spittlebug. In spite of these terrible conditions, the fawn crop was good and adult deer sighted here were in good shape.

The Onaway Bow Hunter guides and dog owners who conduct the annual MBH Cat Hunt have taken advantage of the legal training season to put their dog on coon just for the chase — as often as possible. The object being to get the dogs trimmed down and limered up after their three months of being penned in. These men train their dogs to run what ever game they put them on the track of, so that they can have a "chase" of some kind the greater part of the year. So, following the coon chase training of August, dogs and men go north in the U.P. and try their luck at chasing Michigan's Black Bear. In October & November they are back again at the coon. Then just as soon as the snow flys the fox and coyote are the chased, with the bob cat catching it in January and part of February. By March they back again to the fox and coyote till the snow leaves the ground. On their bear

hunt this year they were lucky enough to have one treed and had a good chase at another. But then the rains came and they had trouble finding a track. One dog failed to return from the hunt and another suffered slight injuries from the bear. This didn't cool their ardor much though as any of the hounds start soundin' off the minute a pick-up or huntin' car (all well known to the dogs) comes in the drive. —— all hopin' they will be the ones to be let loose on a hot track.
