WHAT MBH DOES FOR YOU

The Michigan Bow Hunters for the enjoyment of its members sponsors the following events every year:-Mail Carp Contest — Deer Silhouette Shoot and Bobcat Hunt. Besides this, various districts sponsor carp shoots, silhouette shoots and other hunts of interest to bow hunters. District 8, annually sponsors a "Bear Silhouette Shoot" at Marshall the last week end in August.

The "Mail Carp Contest" gives more than \$200.00 in cash prizes plus trophies for the juniors participating in this event. There are divisions for the men, women and juniors.

The "Annual Deer Silhoutte Shoot" is for hunting tackle with life size deer targets. This shoot is held each vear on the last full week end before the start of the deer season. Several thousand dollars in merchandise awards are distributed from top to bottom as well as trophies for bare bow and free style winners in mens. women and junior divisions. Merchandise is awarded on the Lewis System.

The MBH District 8 Annual Bear Silhouette Shoot is held the last full week end in August and many merchandise awards are awarded from the top to the bottom. These events give you opportunity to try out your hunting tackle before taking to the woods for the actual hunt as well as the opportunity to meet and compare notes with other bow hunters.

Your membership card also entitles you to participate in the annual Archers only bobcat hunt held each

winter in the Onaway area Guides and trained hounds are furnished.

If you are not participating in these events you are missing a part of your membership. It takes a lot of man hours to hold and plan these activities and a large turnout helps to say thank you to the people who worked those many hours.

Let's all invite one of our friends to join the Michigan Bow Hunters and participate in the above activities. We are sure that both you and your friend will have an enjoyable day as we will with you and your new member.

'NOCKIN' 'ROUND THE NORTH

The continuous summer rains have kept everything clean and green. Brakes and grasses most as high as your head MAY create a problem come October. Deer will be hard to spot with all that cover. WELL, maybe we'll have an early frost, winds, and more rain to "bash" 'em down before the BIG day. Right now, however, plants are lush and FULL of fruit -- so the deer and little creatures should have full tummies.

There have been several reports of black bear in our north country as well as the north, north country of the U.P. The most recent was a 200 pound bear in the Atlanta area of Montmorency county. Bear in the UP are being spotted in areas not before frequented by them. The township dumps up there and some in our area here have been enclosed

and the animals are seeking new trails to feeding spots.

So many bowhunters seek information as to location where the deer are concentrated. This is a very hard question to answer as where the deer are this month they are NOT as October rolls around. There are deer in most all of our state hunting lands up here where there is food for them. In areas that have been browsed over the deer have either moved out to other feeding grounds or have died of starvation. There are times they frequent the farm lands and wheat fields and other times when they stay close to water to avoid the heat of a dry spell or when the fawns are small. It has been our experience that most often the animals are feeding on huckleberry brush and fall mushrooms when the opening day rolls around. These mushrooms are those common to the jack-pine areas and will pop up very quickly after a rain. Later however they will stick pretty much to the oak ridges and feed on acoms In those areas where there have been planned cuttings and timber activity you will find a number of deer sticking pretty close.

It might be a good idea to write the Chamber of Commerce of the town nearest the areas you think you would like to hunt and obtain county maps. These will give you a guide to state hunting lands and roads and trails in and around. When you come for the hunt you may wish to get a plat book of the county. Most of them are available at some Local merchant in the larger towns of the counties

Have you looked at your hunting arrows lately? Need new feathers? Heads need replacing? NOW is the time to get it done. October 1st is just around the corner!

VP's MESSAGE

The summer is moving along rapidly and before you know it the fall months will be upon us with the 1967 hunting season.

Let's hope you are all planning on attending the bear and deer silhouette shoots. The first is the Bear Silhouette Shoot which will be held at Marshall on August 26th & 27th. This is an annual event that MBH District 8 puts on.

On Sunday September 10th Three Rivers will hold a combination Deer and Bear Silhouette Shoot. District 7 is in charge of this District Shoot.

MICHIGAN BOW HUNTERS SPECIAL BULLETIN AUGUST, 1967

LEGISLATION

House Bill 2717 has been signed into law by the Governor after passing both the Senate and House of Representatives and takes immediate effect. This means that with the opening of the bow and arrow hunting season you can hunt deer with bow and arrow in Zone 2 and 2 from October 2 thru November 5th and in Zone 3 from October 1 thru December 31st except the season will be closed during the gun season. By purchasing a gun license and abiding by gun regulations you could still hunt during the gun season if you didn't already have a deer.

This extended season will allow bow hunters seventy-six (76) hunting days in Zone 3. Please remember that there is a great deal of state owned land in Zone 3 on which you can hunt but Zone 3 is also heavily populated and there is a great deal of private property. YOU CAN NOT HUNT ON PRIVATE PROPERTY WITHOUT FIRST OBTAINING THE LANDOWNERS PERMISSION.

In the Game Law Digest that you receive when you purchase your hunting license you will find a small map of Michigan that designates the three zones. If you are not sure of boundary lines please ask your local Conservation Officer for clarification.

Vice President Douglas Bertrem deserves a great deal of praise and a big thank you for his untiring efforts and many long hours of work in gettings these added hunting days for the bow hunters. I believe the best way to say thanks to Doug would be to sign up all your hunting partners in the Michigan Bow Hunters. It is these membership dollars that allows MBH to always strive to keep the good hunting legislation we already have and to keep looking ahead for better hunting conditions.

woods.

I usually go north hunting deer with a group of friends who have stuck together for more than ten years. We camp out in the woods on state land and do our own individual cooking as this lets everyone hunt or spend his leisure as he sees fit without bothering anyone else.

In deer hunting, some hunters are morning hunters. That is, they rise very early in the morning and are out at the crack of dawn. But try as I will, this is very difficult for me. I feel that this is part of my vacation so I spend it as such. I get up around eight in the morning and have a leisurely breakfast and grab my bow and head out for the wide open spaces. This is one of the enjoyable times I like in bow hunting, fresh air after a good nights sleep. Just wandering through the woods and openings, I am ever watchful for the wary and elusive deer. Oh, I have had shots this way but never real close or real good situation shots But wandering through the woods listening to the birds and seeing the small animals scurrying to cover on my approach is a great feeling.

My prime time for hunting is from around two in the afternoon until dark. Then I am in a well concealed blind trying to stay as motionless as possible and as I sit there chickadees are in and out of my blind. I have even had them land

on my arrow and on my shoulder.

As you sit in your blind watching for a herd of deer your eyes feel as though they are coming out of your head. Then all of a sudden, without having to move your head, out of the corner of your eye you see a movement and in a few seconds there is a deer moving to your

apple tree. Here the excitement begins. He is still out of range but that is when your heart starts to pound. Sometimes I'd swear someone is beating a big bass drum. Your broadhead starts moving and you wonder why, you suddenly realize you are shaking, not from nervousness but from excitement. The deer is now getting in range and you wait until he is not too wary. He bends down and picks up an apple and takes a bite out of it. Everything is so still you can hear the crunch of his chewing. Then he is taking another bite and he is not quite so nervous. You ease out of your cramped position muscles aching, but you don't want to flub your only shot. Now you slowly scan the area to make sure no other deer are in sight to possibly spook your quarry. Your shaking has subsided a little and you feel your muscles are ready. You get into position-the deer drops his head for another bite and your bow comes up sighting in on a heart shot. There goes the arrow. There is a loud smack like your fist striking the palm of your hand and the deer bolts, tail down, not caring where he's going. As he charges away you see your fetching extending a little back of where you intended it to go, but you know you've made a hit. As he charges through the woods you hear your shaft banging against trees.

Now there is silence. You light up a cigarette, smoking it about twice as fast as you normally do. You are still shaking but it is a good shake. Then comes the tough part, waiting. You want to take off right now and start looking but you fight the urge

for thirty minutes, an hour, an hour and a half. It will be dark in a couple of hours so now you go first to the spot where the hit occurred and then to look for blood in the direction the deer went. A couple of hundred feet and there is half of your arrow, covered with blood. Now the trail is saturated with red splotches

everywhere. You walk to the side of the trail following the splotches, always looking ahead for the deer. The blood trail gets thinner. What is that ahead? It's only a white log. No, there he is, all stretched out in serenity. You walk up carefully and look for tell tale breathing. There is none. You feel like yelling and letting everyone within the sound of your voice know of your seccess.

You tag and dress him outYour hands are a mess but you
don't mind, because you know that
everyone that sees you it's a sign
of success. You start dragging your
deer out and suddenly you spot one
of your buddies and you have to
relate the entire story to him. He
helps you drag your deer out and
back to camp. Everyone in camp is
congratulating you and slapping you
on the back. You are on cloud nine,
having filled your license and you
spend the rest of your hunting week
enjoying the out of doors.

feeling, breathing good air, seeing beautiful sights, and enjoying the companionship of good friends.

BOW HUNTERS TIP OF THE MONTH

Binoculars are a very handy item to have alone when hunting but they can be very aggravating around your neck and in the way. Just open the top two buttons of your camouflage and drop them inside this outer garment. They should hang just below the last button that is buttoned to hold them and so they will be readily retrievable. place them inside an inner garment as body heat may condense on the cold glass. To keep them properly focused, adjust them to the desired setting and secure with a piece of tape to hold them there.
